For us, Lent is an opportunity to hold up a mirror to ourselves and ask the question, 'who am I? It's a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and how we should live. What will we see when we hold up the mirror to ourselves?

Keeping Lent, the 40 days running up to Easter, could mean taking time to read Scripture, studying a Christian book or spending five minutes each day in silence! We might fast by missing one or two meals, refraining from TV, alcohol, social media, or scrolling on our phones. All of these can help us to give more attention to God in our lives.

Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers.

This year we are supporting Education West Africa as our Lenten Appeal.

St Mary's School has strong links with the school in Kenema in Sierra Leone

Education West Africa helps school pupils in Sierra Leone get a better start to life.

Though education, young people can strive to escape poverty and get a job, earn money, live a healthier life, become independent and contribute to their family and the economy of their country. The charity asks children, teachers and headteachers what their greatest needs are, and set up projects to fulfil those needs. Sierra Leone is one of the poorest countries in the world. Education is key to changing this for future generations.

This year we will have an ecumenical Lent Course over 5 weeks starting on Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> March at 7pm at St Mary's School. Other dates will be Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> March, Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> March and Wednesday 2<sup>nd</sup> April.

The final session will be on **Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> April** and will be held in **St Mary's Church**.

This year we will be studying the Nicene Creed, (the first part from the Council of Nicaea in 325AD, the second from that of Constantinople in 381AD'

## **Ash Wednesday**

Ash Wednesday marks the first day of the Season of Lent which is a time of prayer and penitence in preparation for Easter. During the liturgy on this day we are reminded of the traditional three disciplines associated with Lent, namely

- 1 Prayer
- **2** Fasting (giving up something)
- **Almsgiving** (supporting financially others who are in need) hence our special Lent Appeal.

These disciplines are adopted as a means of helping us to draw closer to the Lord during this holy season and reminding us of our duty towards others.

We will be marking this day with a **Eucharist at 10.15am and Sung Eucharist at 7.30pm.** The Imposition of Ashes, is the signing of the Cross in ash on our foreheads. These Ashes are made from the burning of palm crosses from last year. This is an outward sign of our individual and corporate repentance before God and will be offered at both Eucharists.

There will also be special service for Ash Wednesday for our school at 9am.



## Bearing fruit takes time

The nine fruits of the Spirit are Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self-Control. We don't strive for the fruits of the Spirit, rather we plant ourselves in good soil, allow ourselves to be fed by the Holy Spirit, keep taking in nourishment, turn to face the light of Christ and these fruits will develop and grow in our lives.

Can you tell whether a tree is an apple tree or a pear tree? Not easily when they are in blossom, but very easily when they bear fruit. Bearing fruit takes time and a lot of planting, preparation, nurture and growth.

March is the time of year when gardeners begin to plant seeds ready for summer, but patience is needed – the seeds will take a while to germinate, and the gardener needs to write the names of seeds on labels and not forget which are fruit, flowers and vegetables. The seeds need to be in the dark, or the light, or the warmth or the cool, depending at what stage of life they are at.

So too, is God with us. God writes our names on His heart; God knows what fruit we can bring forth. God nurtures us and gives us light to grow. But first, we need to be planted and that can be scary. Maybe you are feeling in a cold dark place this March, maybe it feels as if you've been buried, maybe you've got a weight above you and you can't see the way out. Just think that maybe you've been buried because you've been planted.

With patience there will be warmth and light, be like a seed, trust God, and begin to grow out of the darkness towards God's marvellous light. We won't see fruit immediately; we have to be nourished and mature and ripen.

Patience will be given to us, fruit of the seed of the Holy Spirit.

## Clocks go Forward

Don't forget the clocks go forward by one hour at 1am on 30<sup>th</sup> March. (Clocks 'spring forward' in spring). This marks the beginning of British Summertime which started when the Summer Time Act was passed in 1916 so that people in the northern hemisphere could make more use of the daylight hours. Double Summer Time (Greenwich Mean Time + 2 hours) was used during the WW2.

## Mothering Sunday – 30<sup>th</sup> March

The Fourth Sunday in Lent was called 'Mid-Lent' or 'Refreshment Sunday', when the rigours of Lent were relaxed. more than for any other Sunday of the season.

On Mothering Sunday people were encouraged to go to their 'Mother Church' (their home church or their home Cathedral) to worship and give thanks. Hence apprentices, and others, went home for the weekend and often brought gifts (or accumulated pay) home to their family.

Today we recognise all those in our lives who offer us care and nurture and are involved in 'mothering us'. We particularly honour all who are mothers or who act as mothers to others, recognising that our spiritual 'mothering' should take place within the family of the local church.

This is in contrast to 'Mother's Day' which is a secular day which has evolved more recently to specifically honour mothers. This is celebrated in other countries on the 2nd Sunday in May. In Britain the two days are kept on the same day.

At St Mary's Church we will have a special service on Mothering Sunday at **10.30am** when floral gifts are distributed.

## St Mary's Tower Clock

Have you noticed the absence of hands on the east facing clock face, the absence of the other clock faces and the deafening silence around each hour? It has been getting progressively more difficult to get the 3 clock faces and the chime synchronised to stop each face showed a different time with the chime several minutes early. A clock which is showing the wrong time is a bad advertisement for the church and worse than a clock which does not work at all. After 130 years it is not surprising that there is wear in the driving cogs and gears, the cause of the problem. The remedy is to dismantle the mechanism take it away for cleaning and repair. To do this it is necessary to remove the clock hands and while rope access experts are taking them off, take advantage and remove the clock faces which show wear and discolouration to get them refurbished. All this took place at the beginning of February. The various parts are now in the respective workshops and when finished will be replaced, hopefully being more reliable than has recently been the case.

#### Weathervane

It took a long time, but the old, overweight Cockrill was eventually replaced by a slimmer and more sprightly youngster just before Christmas. The old one was so fat and heavy that he was refusing to turn to the wind, placing an undue load on the oak post where he roosted. Unfortunately, slimming was not possible and retirement the only option. However, there is life in the old bird yet and he is currently resting in the shed pending a final decision on his retirement home. The new slimline version is lighter but the same breed, being exactly the same shape and size. We hope he will serve for many years to come.

## **Future Developments**

Following the survey seeking ideas and suggestions for how the church might be developed and used to face future challenges a Building Development Task Group has been set up to examine the results and prepare a masterplan for further consideration. The first decision taken by the Group was to consider the work in two distinct stages, firstly to tackle the ongoing maintenance issues to keep the building weathertight and secondly to consider the interior and the survey suggestions.

The work needed in the first stage is largely identified in the Architect's Quinquennial Report. The PCC agreed with the Group's advice to supplement this with data obtained from a drone survey of the higher, inaccessible areas of the church and has commissioned the Architect to proceed with preparation of the necessary documentation to facilitate obtaining Diocesan consent and establishing a contract for the work. This is in hand with the aim of being able to obtain tenders for the work as soon as sufficient funds are available to pay for it.

The second stage initially involved analysis of the responses to the survey. This revealed that the issues most frequently mentioned were related to parking, seating, accommodation and toilet facilities. All the other matters raised would be dealt with in conjunction with one or more of the major items. Parking is not a matter which comes within the remit of the Task Group, being a Diocesan matter. All the other items being considered are associated with the interior layout and use of the building.

The Task Group is considering alternative ways that the suggestions might be met to enable a master plan for the work to be developed. Included in this will be suggestions relating to the aims and and objectives giving rise to the need for change.

Consideration will also be given to how any eventual conclusion is presented, both to the community and to the relevant authorities who will have to give consent for any development to be implemented.

Whatever is decided, the need will be to set out the aims and objectives of the Church for the future and then to suggest solutions for wider debate and eventual decision.

## **Pulborough Village Market**

Pulborough Village Market is celebrating its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year having been set up in 2000 by the Pulborough Millenium Society. Every month we have a lovely selection of stalls selling food and crafts alongside our popular market cafe - an excellent place to meet up with friends for a cup of tea, a bacon bap and a good chat!

The market supports the local Macmillan fundraising group which it turn supports the palliative care unit based in Midhurst.

The churchwardens are having a new initiative to help raise funds for the church. They will be selling local honey, parmesan cheese from Rudgwick, local eggs, home-made soups, home-made cheesy biscuits and just a touch of jigsaw puzzles.

## **News from the Friends of Pulborough Parish Church**

## The Story So far.....

The Friends was launched at beautiful Champs Hill in December 2022, by kind permission of the Bowerman Charitable Trust with the aim of ensuring the future of St Mary's Church, our iconic Grade 1 listed building, and to foster a greater sense of responsibility for its survival. St Mary's Church, which has always been at the centre of the village and community life, stands on high ground overlooking the Arun valley and the Wildbrooks floodplain and is therefore very exposed to the prevailing weather. Built in Sussex sandstone 800 years ago, the masonry is vulnerable and once the stone starts to break down through erosion and frost action, it starts to crumble. We now need to undertake urgent repair work to the church to halt this progress.





Specific Projects......

- 1. The weathervane. Work is completed. Estimate £6,870.
- 2. Church clock. Worn joints and losing time. Work underway. Estimate £12,308. These first two projects have been funded by local donors.
- 3. External fabric. Repairs to masonry, clerestory windows, tower walls and roof gutters. Estimate £350,000. Provided the funds required have been raised, work is due to begin in May 2025. For this work, we are in the process of making grant applications and have already been awarded funds from two of them including the Sussex Historic Churches Trust who have given us the largest sum they have ever awarded, which is very encouraging. We are hopeful of receiving a major grant from another body too. There have also been donations and a promise of matched funding, together with all the money raised by Friends' events over the last 2 years since our Friends' launch.

Funds raised in the last 2 years since our launch We have received a total of £145,926.20 to date which is nearly 42% of our target of £350,000. This comprises the proceeds of local events, donations, subscriptions and grants from charitable trusts.

## Friends fundraising events.....

We have been organising regular events for the last two years which have raised over £20,000. They have included lectures, singing workshops, concerts, film, dances and open gardens.

What we are asking you for:



We continue to work hard with our fundraising to ensure that we are able to send out money to schools in Bo and Freetown Dioceses. Since September we have held a very successful Bring and Buy sale at church on 6<sup>th</sup> October, several talks have been given across East and West Sussex and London all resulting in very generous donations. St Mary's school continue to be very supportive of their link school in Kenema.

The project we have been supporting recently is the rebuilding of a primary school in Bopani in the Bo diocese. We were able to send out money during 2024 to start the rebuild and we have now raised enough money to send out the final instalment to complete this project. The picture below shows the build so far and I will share the completed project when photos arrive. We are also sending money out to St Phillips Primary School in Freetown to pay for desks and benches. Our next project will be to support St Mathias Primary school in Lunsar, Freetown, whose school is in a dreadful condition.

If you manage to wade through all the details of the process, and understand them, it will leave you with admiration for the person in your church who has been brave enough to become the Electoral Roll Officer!

#### Moses revisited

## The Pope calls on journalists to look for good news

The Pope has urged journalists to look out for 'good news' stories among so much doom and gloom in global media coverage. His call came during a gathering in Rome of media professionals from around the world that included an audience with Pope Francis. The Pope said, "I encourage you to discover and make known the many stories of goodness hidden in the folds of the news, imitating those gold-prospectors who tirelessly sift the sand in search of a tiny nugget."

His words come as increasing numbers of people are turning away from news coverage, describing it as "depressing, relentless and boring" according to a recent global survey.

Almost four in 10 people worldwide said they sometimes or often avoid the news, up from just under three in 10 in 2017, according to the report by Oxford University's Reuters Institute.

To counter this, the Pope urged journalists and other media professionals to be 'communicators of hope' in a world where divisive disinformation abounds.

Pope Francis, who heads the world's estimated 1.4 billion Catholics called on all those involved in communications "to focus on beauty and hope even in the midst of apparently desperate situations" and to work to generate "commitment, empathy and concern for others." He said: "Too often today, communication generates not hope, but fear and despair, prejudice and resentment, fanaticism and even hatred."

The message also, perhaps, had criticism for the power and influence being wielded by Big Tech companies, such as Elon Musk's 'X', and Meta – that recently announced it was removing fact-checkers from its US operation.

He said, "In these our times, characterised by disinformation and polarisation, as a few centres of power control an unprecedented

mass of data and information, I would like to speak to you as one who is well aware of the importance – now more than ever – of your work as journalists and communicators."

He called on journalists to communicate hope, noting that "The hope of Christians has a face, the face of the risen Lord." His gift of the Holy Spirit "enables us to hope even against all hope, and to perceive the hidden goodness quietly present even when all else seems lost."

## Fed up with bad news?

Whilst most of the news overwhelms people with negative narratives, Positive News offers instead a lens on the world that helps give people a fuller picture of reality, supports their wellbeing and focusses on what is going right. They aim to show the rest of the media that good news matters.

#### The Gulf of Mexico or America

As well as Greenland and the Panama Canal (and perhaps Canada), President Trump wants the Gulf of Mexico.

On his very first afternoon in office, he ordered that the name be changed to the Gulf of America.

Apparently American Presidents can do these things. And so, the US Board on Geographic Names was given 30 days to change the gulf's name on all official maps throughout the US. Some navigation apps, including Google Maps, were under pressure to change it immediately.

Trump's reason for changing, he says, is that the ocean basin is "ours" and that the US does "most of the work there".

But President Trump cannot dictate what other countries call the gulf, as it is an international body of water, with coastlines in the US, Mexico and Cuba. And Mexico and Cuba have no plans to follow Trump's lead With that in mind, Britain has politely declined to change the name. In the UK, it will remain the Gulf of Mexico, unless and until Trump's new name for it gains "widespread usage" in English.

#### Social Media is not for children

Most adults would support a ban on under-16-year-olds visiting social media platforms such as X and Instagram.

Such are the findings of a recent survey. It found that 75 per cent of adults favour the minimum age for accessing social media sites to be raised, from 13 to 16 years old.

The survey was conducted by the More in Common think tank. It reports that support for raising the age level is found right across the political spectrum: 79 per cent of Conservative voters, 75 per cent of Labour voters, 76 per cent of Liberal Democrat voters, and 81 per cent of Reform UK voters

Concern about the effects of social media on young people comes at a time when tech giants are facing increasing criticism about the impact their platforms can have on young people.

The survey also found that 71 per cent of adults want a ban on all smartphones in school, while 14 per cent oppose the idea.

## Should the Churches agree on a common date for Easter

That is the question for the leaders of the Roman Catholic and the Eastern Orthodox Churches, as this year (2025) marks the 1700<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the First Ecumenical Council of Nicaea. Patriarch Bartholomew of Constantinople believes that 2025 is a 'golden opportunity' for Catholic and Orthodox believers to finally agree on a joint date for Easter, because this year also brings a 'fortunate alignment' of the Easter dates of both churches. "It is indeed regrettable that 1700 years later, we are still debating this issue," he says.

Any agreement would only pertain to the date of Easter's celebration. It would not involve any joint liturgical practices. Those would require ecclesial communion between the churches, something which does not yet exist.

In 2016 the Archbishop of Canterbury held talks with Coptic Pope Tawadros II in Cairo, when he hoped that a unified date for Easter might be achieved within ten years. He commented that, for the C of E, either the second or third Sunday in April would be acceptable.
